CHAMPION DANCE TEAM

The Rutgers Women's Dance team won the National Championships this year, having come in 2nd last year. The Dance team, along with the Cheerleading team, supports the basketball and football teams at all home games and competes each year for a National Championship. They are also required to represent the University at various community functions. Practices are typically three nights a week but can be up to seven, as competition comes closer. One of the strengths of this team is its technical talent. All of the girls on the team have previous dance experience, having studied tap, jazz, and ballet. Each year the Dance Team places among the best in the nation and for the past three years they have been National Champions or runners-up. While no scholarship money is available, the dancers do earn a Varsity Letter. Coach Christine Zoffinger heads the Cheerleading and Dance Teams.

The Dance Team comes out to Santa Barbara each July for a training clinic. RU SPORTS/NEWS

Piscataway, NJ (Dec. 1, 2000) - Greg Schiano has been named head football coach at Rutgers University, it was announced today by Director of Athletics Robert E. Mulcahy III. Schiano, 34, comes to Rutgers from the University of Miami where he served the last two seasons as defensive coordinator. During his highly successful two-year stint, the Hurricanes posted a 19-5 record.

Piscataway, NJ (Nov. 3, 2000) - Rutgers University head football coach Terry Shea resigned his position, effective at the conclusion of the 2000 season, it was announced today by Director of Athletics Robert E. Mulcahy III. "We are appreciative of Terry Shea's efforts during his tenure as head football coach at Rutgers University," Mulcahy said. "Terry will remain as head coach for the remainder of our season, and I know the staff and team will be totally focused on these games." "Terry Shea is a man of integrity, and represented Rutgers University and its football program with the highest degree of class and dignity," Mulcahy added.

In a statement released today, Shea said "My staff and I have worked tirelessly these past five seasons in an effort to establish a winning football program at Rutgers University. This is the first time that I have not succeeded in establishing a winning program at the major college level. I sincerely appreciate the opportunity to serve as the head football coach for Rutgers University these past five seasons, and the commitment and friendship of Dr. Lawrence and Bob Mulcahy. I recognize and extend my deepest appreciation to my coaching staff, to the young men - the Scarlet Knights - who play football at Rutgers, and especially to my family, my wife Susan and my children, Jennifer, Garrett and Daniel."

Under Shea, the Scarlet Knights have compiled a 11-41 record in four-plus seasons. Shea, who has over 30 years experience in collegiate football, has an overall record of 26-47-2 as a head coach, including 15-6-2 in two seasons (1990-91) at San Jose State. Shea was named BIG EAST Coach of the Year in 1998 after guiding Rutgers to a 5-6 record.

Hartford, CT (Nov. 12, 2000) Rutgers University head coach C. Vivian Stringer will be a member of the 2001 induction class into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame, the organization announced today at the State Farm Tip-Off Classic in Hartford, Conn.

RU study confirms protein's role in obesity (Dec. 15, 2000) Prof. Dawn Brasaemle at Cook College has published a paper in the *Journal of Biological Chemistry* describing how perilipin, a protein found in fat cells, acts to retain fat in humans and other animals. The article corroborates an earlier study about the role of perilipin in mice cells

RUTGERS —BEFORE THE CIVIL WAR

What was it like to be a student at Rutgers in the period before the Civil War? The curriculum sounds tough by modern standards: heavy doses of Greek and Latin, Christian piety, history, geography and increasing math, science, and modern languages. It was, however, not as deadly as might first appear.

Classical language training was commonly regarded as a mark of wisdom and many students were eager to acquire it. Some students enjoyed “moral philosophy” a predecessor to the social sciences; it was taught to seniors by the President and was made relevant to the times. Many students liked the sciences (especially after the 1840s) such as the chemistry lab with its explosions and smells.

The faculty was not all rigid: they often knew the students well, some joked with them, and put up with a certain amount of disorder in the classroom. There was even evidence that early Rutgers was not very difficult academically. A student spoof from 1859 suggests that the Greek qualifying exam was a farce, and that anyone who showed up with a smattering of language would be admitted, for the college needed all the students it could get. In fact in the 1880's, President Gates took pride in the fact that he raised admission standards to the level that 25% were rejected.

The pre Civil War years were also the classical period of loco parentis, when faculty clergymen were strict and comprehensive authorities over the students. Although the student code looks tough on paper, with such strictures as: “No student shall frequent taverns or any house of ill repute, or be guilty of cursing, screaming, of any unbecoming language,” given the lack of dorms, this was easier said than enforced.

Many of the boarding-houses were in fact casually supervised collections of a half dozen or more male students, perhaps run by a widow and her daughters. The flavor of one is suggested in a later reminiscence about Mansion House on Albany Street, run in the 1860's by Justice James Nevius: The students were so frequently brought before the Judge that they thought it would be more convenient for all hands if as many as possible boarded in the house.

In 1868, the faculty voted to enlist the help of Justice Nevius to discover who had exploded the “back building” (latrine) one evening. The culprit was never found! Besides blowing up outhouses, what other extracurricular activities occupied our predecessors. Find out in the next Targum West.
